

Addressing Costs of Anti-Seizure Medicines



Anti-seizure medicines can be expensive. There are some ways to lower the cost of anti-seizure medicines when the price is too high. Every state has different assistance programs and your healthcare providers may be able to help. Details can depend on your health insurance status but we have some tips below to help you.

First Step

Talk with your doctor or nurse. Tell them about any concerns you have. Share with them if your medicine is too expensive for you. Sometimes, a change in your health insurance can make it harder to get your anti-seizure medicine. It is important to tell your doctor/nurse if this happens to you. You might also be able to get your anti-seizure medicine from your doctor's office for a more affordable price.

Programs to Help

Some drug companies have programs that help people with the cost of anti-seizure medicines. One of those programs is called RxAssist. This program helps people find free or cheaper medicine. Please visit: <https://www.rxassist.org/>

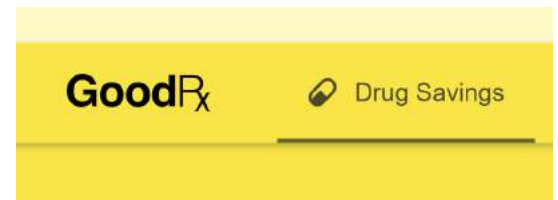
You can also check the website(s) of the company that makes your anti-seizure medicine to see if they have similar programs.
